## A NOTE FROM OUR LEADERSHIP

Dear [Re]builder Family,

I want to express my deepest gratitude for your support this past year. As pandemic vaccines became widely available in 2022, we felt our community breathe a cautious sigh of relief as it became safer to gather together in volunteer groups large and small.

In the summer of 2021, our hearts expanded as we hosted in-person volunteer projects again. And in the spring of 2022, we hosted our first National Rebuilding Day in three years. Many thanks to all of *you* for making that happen!

2022 also brought other great successes for our organization and the neighbors we serve:

- We were awarded a \$1.6 million grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to provide free home repairs to low-income families in DC and Alexandria over the next 3.5 years.
- We expanded our partnership with DC's Department of Aging and Community Living (DACL) to serve more low-income seniors in DC who need safety and mobility modifications in their homes.
- We moved our Alexandria office to Fairfax Street and opened a DC office in Congress Heights.

But the most exciting part of FY 2022 was seeing our volunteers in action once again. Our 1,000+ volunteer base is absolutely critical to creating safe, healthy, and equitable homes and communities.

In this report, you'll read about the impact you've had on our community in FY 2022. We hope you continue to invest in Rebuilding Together DC Alexandria, your neighbors, and your community. Thank you.

# WHY REBUILDING TOGETHER DC ALEXANDRIA?

Affordable, safe, healthy housing is a human right. Yet, tens of thousands of homeowners in our region are living in unsafe, unhealthy homes. Stable housing is key to overall well-being, including mental and physical health, job productivity, student achievement, and financial security.

That's why our work to provide free, critical home repairs to low-income homeowners is essential to creating safe, healthy, and equitable communities, especially for people of color. With the help of volunteers, skilled tradespeople, and the support of funding partners, we provide housing security for hundreds of families and individuals in our region every year by providing no-cost, life-changing home repairs, allowing our clients to spend their limited income on other important expenses like food, healthcare, transportation, and child care.

Since 1986, 31,000+ volunteers have worked on more than 3,000 projects, investing \$10 million worth of in-kind value in Alexandria, VA, and Washington DC.

And because communities can't thrive without safe, functional public spaces and community organizations, our volunteers provide free upgrades and repairs to nonprofit facilities and community spaces throughout DC and Alexandria.



## NATIONAL REBUILDING DAY RETURNS AFTER TWO YEAR HIATUS

For years, we've hosted National Rebuilding Day (NRD), our largest fundraiser and volunteer event, on the last Saturday in April. This year, 16 teams from corporations as well as faith and civic groups provided repairs to 15 homes and 1 nonprofit facility across DC and Alexandria. Though scaled back from our typical NRD of 30-40 teams, the repairs that these groups provided homeowners were critical to keeping these families in safe and healthy homes.

#### for giving 540 individuals safe and healthy homes.

We are committed to addressing hazards in the home for low-income families to improve their health, safety, financial outlook, and quality of life. In partnership with National Center for Healthy Housing, we developed a checklist that helps ensure a home's health and safety for its occupants. We utilize this 25-point list to inform our work scope for each home, focusing our work on the most critical issues. Since 1986, our Safe and Healthy Home program, which is provided to all recipients free of charge, includes emergency home repairs, safety and health-related modifications, and energy-efficient upgrades.

#### Thank you for giving Miss Janet a safe, new kitchen.

Miss Janet has lived in DC her whole life. She raised her children in the same home where she still lives. A single mom of three, she worked multiple jobs to ensure her children were happy, healthy, and safe. Now in her 80s and with limited income, her home has fallen into disrepair. Recently, her two young grandchildren moved in with her — and Miss Janet realized her home was not safe enough for them.

She reached out to Rebuilding Together DC Alexandria in hopes that she and her grandchildren could have a sound home. Her kitchen appliances weren't working and multiple safety hazards were especially dangerous to young children. With your support, Rebuilding Together was able to rehab her kitchen, including installing new appliances. She's now able to cook for her grandbabies as she calls them – and feels a sense of security knowing her home is safe for them to learn and play. Not able to always keep up with their energy, Miss Janet can rest easy knowing that her grandkids have a safe home in which to play, eat, and sleep.



## for making our community stronger by providing repairs and upgrades to seven nonprofits and community centers.

Our Community Strong program improves community spaces used by thousands of residents living in underserved neighborhoods. From community parks and gardens to senior centers and homeless shelters, we renovate these critical community resources that serve our vulnerable populations. Because of the seven Community Strong projects we completed in FY22, children now have safe areas to play, neighbors have community gardens to grow their own food, parents have social connection spaces, seniors have safe facilities to attend, and whole neighborhoods

have been revitalized.

# Fannie Mae gives new life to William Ramsey Recreation Center in Alexandria

In partnership with Fannie Mae, Rebuilding Together DC Alexandria provided repairs and upgrades to William Ramsey Recreation Center which primarily serves a low-income neighborhood in Alexandria. More than 50 volunteers painted murals, created outdoor play spaces, repaired and painted tables and railings, cleaned out the garden and nature center, and planted new gardens.

## Landis Architects and Builders Support Brighter Day Food Pantry

The Brighter Day Food Pantry is an all-volunteer-run food bank that serves nearly 100 individuals in SE DC every Thursday. On National Rebuilding Day, our partners at Landis Architects and Builders provided the food pantry with much-needed upgrades, including new commercial shelving and storage. They also installed railings, repaired a dangerous staircase, and made the space more welcoming for volunteers and the neighbors they serve.





# for helping first time homeowners purchase a home of their own in Alexandria!

Through our Home of Your Own program, we acquire properties, renovate them using volunteers and skilled tradespeople, and sell the units to low-income, first-time homebuyers with greatly subsidized funding. In partnership with the Alexandria Office of Housing, we have provided affordable homes to nearly 50 families since the inception of the program.


